

# Will Our Children be Stewards?

A lively discussion centered around the memories of giving offerings as children when the facilitator asked, “What do the children in this congregation now do about offering?” There was silence and then embarrassment until one quiet voice said, “Nothing, I guess. I hadn’t thought about it until now.”



Quite often there is no Sunday School offering collected. In many congregations children leave the worship service for Sunday School before the offering is given.

Adults of the older generation often begin their stewardship witness saying “My parents taught me to tithe.” How many of our children could say that? If giving is not learned as a child, they may not give as adults.

Children’s money values are influenced by the thousands of underlying messages in advertising we hear each day. According to a global market research company a staggering statistic is that 80% of product purchases are influenced by children! The Church has a tremendous opportunity, and responsibility, to create a culture of generosity that teaches a proportional perspective between earning, giving, saving, and spending money.

“What are we teaching our children about stewardship?” is becoming a critical question for our church. The fact is that we are teaching them very little.

So, will our children be stewards? The answer relies largely on the level of stewardship conversation that we have with the adults and children in our congregations.
